CWAJ PROUDLY CELEBRATES 40 YEARS OF SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

Believing we can better the world through nurturing women leaders

On 20th October 2012 during the 57th CWAJ Print Show, 30 past and current scholars with nearly 50 CWAJ members joined to celebrate the $40^{\mbox{\tiny th}}$ anniversarv at CWAJ's Scholarship Reunion Party. In her toast, the very first scholar to study abroad Miiko Kodama, Professor of Mass

Communication and Journalism Musashi University (now Professor Emeritus), said, " I will be retiring in March but I had to retire from my first job as a television announcer nearly 40 years ago when I



was 28, being told that I was no longer young enough to perform on TV. The CWAJ Scholarship opened a door for that 'old lady' as my experience studying abroad helped me launch a new career."

Before the reunion party, scholars joined docent tours of the Print Show and experienced the Hands-on Art Exhibit which is created every year for visitors with visual impairments. These activities, mingling with other scholars and CWAJ members including those visiting from overseas, reinforced the strong bonds



and friendships that CWAJ scholars maintain with the CWAJ community.

Since 1972, CWAJ has helped 327 women to study at universities and graduate schools both in Japan and abroad, paving the way for their development as leaders in a wide range of fields. The funds for the CWAJ Scholarship Program are raised every year by the Print Show and other events as well as individual and corporate donations.

CWAJ has always focused on women, believing that the best use of our limited funds is to support women who have the passion and determination to make a Unlike social contribution. most scholarships in Japan, CWAJ does not have eligibility restrictions based on age or field of study. For women mid-career and/or with children, this means the opportunity to follow their dreams.

as part of CWAJ 's Additionally, commitment to people with visual impairments, CWAJ was the first organization to provide non-loan academic scholarships. Since its establishment in 1978, 60 recipients of the Scholarship for the Visually Impaired have gone on to become remarkable leaders at the forefront of education, law, business, art, etc.

More recently, CWAJ established the Fukushima Relief Scholarships, part of CWAJ's Great East Japan Relief initiatives, to help students who were directly affected by the March '11 disasters to continue their nursing studies.

As needs in society change, so does CWAJ, but we remain committed to our mission of supporting higher education for women of all nationalities and for men and women with visual impairments.

FUKUSHIMA RELIEF PROJECTS

Since April 2011 CWAJ has been supporting Fukushima victims through a number of relief projects. In December 2012, Misa Yasukawa, 2012 CWAJ President, along with six other CWAJ members visited Soma City and Fukushima City for the second time. As a result of the two visits, we realize the most significant way we can offer support to the people in Fukushima is by demonstrating our awareness of their situation and keeping them in our thoughts.

CWAJ also hopes to continue making financial contributions to the future of the stricken area with warm understanding and support from donors at home and abroad.

Support for the Mental Health Care Center Nagomi

Soma Mental Health Care Center Nagomi is a project center for the maintenance and improvement of the mental health of victims living in temporary housing, patients with mental disorders and their families, as well as local residents at large. On the occasion of the opening of the Nagomi Center in January 2012, CWAJ donated a van with a wheelchair lift to facilitate home visits and the transportation of patients. The Nagomi van bearing the red CWAJ logo travels through the city daily, assisting those in need.

On our December visit, CWAJ presented 190,000 yen for maintenance and insurance for the van. Additionally,



of play equipment, toys and art materials (valued at 150,000 yen) were donated for the Center's Saturday program for

children living in temporary housing. As a special gift, we also presented both Nagomi and Fukushima Medical University Hospital with a framed print inscribed "Ganbatte Tohoku!" (Wishing you all the best, Tohoku!). These were kindly donated by MINAMI Masao.

This is what the Naqomi 'Activity Report' on their website had to say about CWAJ's donation of toys:

"The first Saturday Children's Program in 2013 was held on 12th January. Twenty two children and mothers attended. In December we received from CWAJ a generous gift of plastic tunnels, large color blocks, picture books, drawing papers, cravons etc. The most popular toy of the day was a soft hoop ring! It can be used as a jump rope, or as a hula hoop to swing around the waist, and when the staff held the ring up, children enjoved throwing balls through it. Children are so innovative that they find numerous ways to play with one toy. It is such a joy to watch them play. We receive power from them."

Fukushima Relief Scholarships

The Fukushima Relief Scholarships, launched in 2012, are specially designated to assist male and female students at The Fukushima Medical University School of Nursing who were directly affected by the March '11 disasters to continue their studies. The award of 500,000 yen per year is almost equivalent to a full year's tuition. All four recipients of the 2013 scholarships (two are in their second year of the two-year scholarship) are from Fukushima Prefecture and either had their homes damaged or were required to evacuate due to the nuclear power plant accident. The two most recent recipients entered the university in April 2011, just a few weeks after the earthquake and tsunami.

On our visit to Fukushima in December, we were able to meet with the 2012 scholars to hear about their progress.



We also met with Professor Yoko Nakayama of Fukushima Medical University School of Nursing as well as Assistant Professor Takako Okawa who is in charge of the Nagomi administration. It was rewarding to hear from Professor Nakayama about the positive impact of the CWAJ scholarships. Currently no other scholarships are available to students in the School of Nursing.

CWAJ Fukushima Art Project (plan) Print artists played an important role in raising funds for CWAJ's Fukushima Relief Projects. It was the artists themselves who approached CWAJ with the idea of donating their prints to support the relief efforts. Letters were sent to a selection of artists exhibiting at the 2011 and 2012 Print Shows and resulted in 143 prints being generously donated by 37 artists. The sale of these prints at the 2012 Print Show raised more than 1.5 million yen. CWAJ used part of the fund to purchase and donate art materials and toys for Nagomi. Educational art programs for children in Fukushima are also being arranged.

CWAJ is grateful for the generous contributions from members and friends all over the world. The reconstruction of Fukushima will take a long time. Your ongoing support will enable us to continue our relief projects.

Every year art lovers eagerly await Japan's largest annual exhibition and sale of contemporary Japanese prints the CWAJ Print Show. It all started in 1956 at the 1st Print Show, which featured 91 contemporary woodblock prints (*hanga*) by 39 artists. In 2012, the 57th Print Show presented 201 prints by 200 artists.

The Print Show is CWAJ's main fundraiser. The proceeds go to the Scholarship and Education Programs as well as the Fukushima Relief Projects.

The 57th Print Show had a special feature: a selection of artists donated small prints for a special sale to support CWAJ's relief efforts in Fukushima.

In addition, we are grateful to Mercedes-Benz Connection for providing free space at their showroom in Roppongi Midtown for a series of exhibitions promoting the Print Show and raising awareness of CWAJ's mission.

The Associate Show, which debuted in 1968, has offered in-depth explorations of focused topics. In 2012 the Associate

Show featured monotype artworks by four young printmakers—FUJITA Yumeka, MAENO Tomohiko, OKUYAMA Naoto, and ONO Kouseki. In 2013 the Associate Show will present oil paintings, paintings on glass, tea bowls, and sculptures by renowned Print Show artists.

In addition to the scholarships and projects mentioned on previous pages, CWAJ also works to support and promote the development of *hanga* as well. The Art Grant inaugurated in 1985 has evolved into the new Artist-in-Residence Program. The Young Printmaker Award was established in 2005.

CWAJ supports people with visual impairments

CWAJ's ongoing programs for people who are visually impaired (VI) make an enduring, positive impact by providing (i) scholarships for VI to study in Japan and abroad, (ii) English instruction and events for VI to learn and apply English skills, and (iii) opportunities to appreciate works of art at *Hands-on Art* Exhibit at the Print Show.

CWAJ Scholarship for the Visually Impaired

Japanese undergraduate and graduate students with visual impairments are eligible for scholarships to study in Japan and abroad. See p.2 for 2012 recipients.

VVI (Volunteers for the Visually Impaired)

VVI has been a leader in responding to the needs of the visually impaired community since 1975, primarily through the English language programs that broaden their career and personal growth opportunities.

Japan Vocational Development Center for the Blind

CWAJ volunteers teach English conversation classes twice a week to adults with visual impairment as part of their job training program.

English Conversation Gatherings

2012 was a year of record attendance at three English conversation gatherings, two of which were hosted by Embassies. CWAJ member Israeli Ambassadress Carmela Ben Shitrit introduced the intellectual, technical and cultural achievements of Israel. Oman Al-Muslahi Ambassador described Oman's long-standing relationship with Japan, including student exchanges. The third gathering highlighted Easter and spring celebrations in the US, Germany and India. About 35 VI learned firsthand at each gathering about customs and cultures around the world.



Special Needs Education School for the Visually Impaired, University of Tsukuba

In June and November, in a program provided only by CWAJ, 16 volunteers gave mock interviews to 35 VI high school students to help them prepare for the Eiken English Proficiency Test.

VVI Newsletter

Three informative and interesting issues a year – spring, summer and fall– were distributed to 194 individuals in 2012 by email, in braille and enlarged type.

Hands-on-Art Exhibit

35 VI attended Hands-on Art (HoA) at the Print Show in 2012. Four prints were made into tactile prints called 'raised images' which VI touch to feel the



general composition of the print. HIROTA Raifu generously lent an artist proof of his print providing a special chance for VI to touch an actual print. HoA is a unique opportunity for VI to enjoy art with the general community. CWAJ members guide VI through HoA and the Print Show. VI could also listen to an audio-tape of the artists' descriptions of their prints.

Cultural Programs

The CWAJ Cultural Programs provide enjoyable educational events for the community at large and are usually conducted in English.

On 17th March 2012, a charity concert of koto and shakuhachi music by Curt and Bruce Duo was held at the Franciscan Chapel Center in Roppongi. The "Going Home — Reflections on Fukushima" concert was attended by 250 and raised over 400,000 yen to support CWAJ's Relief Projects.



On 30th November 2012, a presentation about Tokyo Skytree and its construction was given by Mr Hiroshi Takagi of Obayashi Corporation, a Japanese construction company with a rich history responsible for building the tower. The audience of 100 was fascinated to learn the inside story of the construction and functions of the world's tallest free standing broadcasting tower built with technology. cutting-edge Japanese Additionally, Mr Makoto Kanai, the Vice President of Obayashi Corporation, provided an interactive surprise quiz with prizes.

Two cultural programs are planned for 2013. Open to the public, all proceeds will go to support CWAJ's scholarship

program. Please join us at "Kimono Magic", a fun event highlighting creative ideas to wear kimono in modern times, on 14^{th} May 2 - 4 pm at International House.

Education Programs Children's English Circle

During 2012 CWAJ volunteers held 30 after-school activity classes for Japanese elementary school children who have returned to Japan after living abroad. The children had fun exploring various topics through reading, arts, crafts and singing. Children's English Circle's goal is to help these children to retain their English skills.

Foreign Students' Circle

35 foreian students from eight countries participated in Foreign Students' Circle programs in 2012. They had a lecture in Pasona on working in Japan, attended Kabuki, Noh and Bunraku performances, and experienced making soba noodles. CWAJ volunteers assist foreign students seeking guidance and friendship while living in Japan.
