

CWAJ Open Print Art Gallery

The women of CWAJ have, from the inception of our organization, found possibilities in the face of challenges, and we were certainly presented with significant challenges in 2020. The most visible example of our ability to find opportunity in difficult times is the CWAJ Open Print Art Gallery (OPAG), our first virtual exhibition and sale of contemporary Japanese print art.

The CWAJ Print Show is an internationally acclaimed annual event that has taken place in a spacious gallery in Tokyo 63 times since 1956. It has become known as an eagerly anticipated, not-to-be-missed event in the Tokyo arts calendar, but it is also so much more. The Print Show supports Japanese artists and promotes contemporary Japanese print art, with all proceeds going toward funding CWAJ scholarships. Given the importance of this mission, our members were determined that circumstances would not force the cancellation of this extraordinary show. Working together, CWAJ members found the courage to be innovative with the beloved Print Show and converted it into an online format.

Transforming the in-person CWAJ Print Show was a tremendous success thanks to CWAJ volunteers who worked tirelessly and collaboratively to offer 231 artists a platform to exhibit their work on the beautiful digital CWAJ Open Print Art Gallery. Members and guests who visited the site perused a collection of 235 gorgeous prints and made purchases from the comfort of their own homes. The virtual nature of the OPAG afforded CWAJ overseas members a very special way to reconnect with the Print Show and to purchase prints. International sales were robust, exemplifying the appreciation for Japanese print art outside Japan that CWAJ has fostered for more than six decades.

The OPAG even included an online guided tour, which is a popular aspect of the CWAJ Print Show that offers a personal touch.

Although the OPAG was planned as an all virtual experience, we were fortunate to partner with AoyamaTreehouse and hold a small, yet lovely, one night only, in-person kick-off event for AoyamaTreehouse members and CWAJ donors. AoyamaTreehouse is an innovative space infused with creativity where CWAJ exhibited a selection of prints that were offered for sale. Katsutoshi Yuasa gave a fascinating lecture about his printmaking technique at the event.

Following the reception at AoyamaTreehouse, CWAJ member Marie Ando graciously agreed to exhibit those same prints at Gallery Takanawa AO, a space that Marie and her husband, Yoichi, own in Tokyo.

Launching the OPAG illustrates the dedication and determination of the women of CWAJ. Throughout these pages, you will read about dynamic CWAJ members finding possibilities all through 2020.

Artist Talk with HIROTA Raifu

Hands-on Art (HoA), a much-loved feature of the CWAJ Print Show since 1996, provides raised images that offer visitors who are visually impaired an opportunity to engage with print art along with sighted visitors.

In conjunction with the **Open Print Art Gallery**, HoA held a virtual Artist Talk with Raifu Hirota on October 24. Mr. Hirota, a highly regarded artist from Kanagawa, is known for his colorful music-themed linocuts. His print, "Bare Piano," was produced as a raised image, and sent to 26 visually impaired guests by post before the lecture.

Mr. Hirota's presentation was delightfully engaging. He shared the secrets of his fabulous colors with all 110 participants by taking us through successive stages of the production with work-in-progress images from "Bare Piano." CWAJ member, Michiko Okubo, provided an impeccable interpretation.

After the presentation, visually impaired participants and CWAJ members engaged in an interesting conversation gathering with the artist. Mr. Hirota answered everyone's questions with his usual charm. Thank you so much, Mr. Hirotal

Comment from a pianist who is visually impaired:

"As the artist's work was a piano, I participated with great fascination. First of all, thank you for sending me the raised image in advance so I could observe it thoroughly. When I received it, I immediately counted the black keys on the print and was surprised that the printed piano was faithfully reproduced even though it was in A4 size. I listened to Hirota's talk with great interest. I thought that because the piano was painted in bright red, it shouldn't be different to the touch, but somehow it gave me a different impression. I think this is because I was able to see colors until I was about 20 years old. I was fascinated by the color of the strings when I heard that he layered many colors."

CWAJ Pandemic Response Scholarship for Nursing Students (NS)

CWAJ announced the Pandemic Response Scholarship for Nursing Students in response to the needs of our community. Members sprang into action upon learning that nursing students were facing financial hardship as they had to give up part-time work to avoid the risk of viral infection. Japan needs women graduating from nursing school who are qualified to fill these vital roles.

Drawing on our long history of awarding scholarships, particularly the Fukushima Relief Scholarship, CWAJ volunteers incorporated this new scholarship for nurses into our donations drive. Response from both applicants and donors was vigorous. CWAJ is pleased to award six scholarships of ¥500,000 each to women studying nursing in Tokyo Metropolitan Area Universities and Fukushima Medical School for the 2021-2022 academic year.

The CWAJ Board of Directors voted unanimously to extend this response scholarship for another year.

In Memoriam: SHINODA Toko (March 28, 1913 – March 1, 2021)

CWAJ mourns the loss of Toko Shinoda, one of the leading Japanese artists of the 20th century and a true supporter of CWAJ and its core mission. Shinoda praised the role that CWAJ played in promoting Japanese print art, and encouraged fellow printmakers to participate in the CWAJ Print Show. On more than 50 occasions beginning in 1966, she contributed her own artwork to the CWAJ Print Show, as well as to special exhibitions sponsored by CWAJ. She graciously spoke at several CWAJ events, including the kick-off luncheon for the 40th CWAJ Print Show, at which she revealed that the origin of her art was her childhood experience of sprinkling water outside and watching the stones and soil change color when hit by the droplets.

CWAJ expresses its profound respect for Shinoda and her support of CWAJ, as well as its sincere gratitude for the wonderment that she delivered through her works and her words of encouragement.

Scholarships = Possibilities!

New possibilities can be revealed in the face of difficult circumstances. The Scholarship Committee faced the challenges of 2020 and welcomed wonderful learning opportunities, such as including overseas members on scholarship selection committees and creating the Pandemic Response Scholarship for Nursing Students, which was greeted with much enthusiasm by members and donors alike.

The Scholarship Committee introduced all seven 2020 Scholars during our first-ever online presentation at our May general meeting, with 160 attendees, including past scholars, overseas members, members of the press and other guests. Two past scholars, Ririna Kaneko (SVI-SJ 2017) and Saule Zholdayakova (NJG 2017), spoke about how their CWAJ scholarships provided them with numerous opportunities.

Every CWAJ scholarship comes with possibilities, and in some cases, even more prospects than the scholar had originally imagined. We are particularly proud and gratified when a CWAJ Scholar thrives. Notably, three past SVI-SJ Scholars earned their PhDs in 2020:

NAKAMURA, Masaya (2014) PhD in Special Education: Mr. Nakamura was a high school teacher when he lost his eyesight, but not his passion for education. He has published his thesis and donated a copy to CWAJ.

IZUMI, Masayuki (2015) PhD in Dentistry: Mr. Izumi is determined to encourage the independence of those living with disability by being a positive role model. His accomplishment is a tremendous example.

HANDA, Kozue (2007) PhD in Art: Ms. Handa considers disability not as a disadvantage, but something that provides a unique understanding. Her goal is to create more fulfilling methods of appreciation and learning for all visitors to cultural exhibits and museums in Japan.

2021 CWAJ Young Printmaker Award (YPA)

CWAI established the Young Printmaker Award (YPA) in 2005 as part of the 50th Print Show celebration to encourage the development of young artists. Eligible applicants are creators of the top prints selected at the Annual Exhibition of the Association of Japan Art Colleges held every year in December at the Machida City Museum of Graphic Arts. The recipient of this annual award of 500,000 yen is selected based on his/her project proposal, artistic potential and creativity.

COMMUNITY SERVICE

Volunteers for the Visually Impaired (VVI)

English Conversation Gatherings (ECG) offer opportunities for Japanese individuals who are visually impaired to discuss specific topics in English with CWAJ members. Starting in May 2020, ECG took a giant leap and moved these exciting events to a virtual platform. All three Virtual ECGs, focused on Hobbies (May), Food (August), Traditions (December), were extremely successful. ECG partnered with Hands-on Art to sponsor an artist talk by Hirota Raifu in connection with the Open Print Art Gallery in October that was popular and well-attended.

Between 14 and 22 visually-impaired guests took part in each virtual event, which included presentations and conversation in small groups in breakout rooms. ECG provided Zoom training to guests unfamiliar with the platform, and mailed a tactile object, such as a raised image of print art for the artist talk or a cut paper snowflake for the discussion of traditions, to participants in advance of an event to increase their engagement with the presentations.

ECG has received incredible feedback from guests who are visually impaired, who enjoyed participating in discussions in breakout rooms with native English speakers and other visually impaired guests of similar English language ability. Virtual ECGs have made it possible for overseas CWAI members to participate in VVI activities, and have increased opportunities for guests with visual impairment to join in from their homes without the challenges of traveling to a venue.

In 2021, we plan to offer both in-person and virtual ECG.

Other VVI activities include English classes at Japan Vocational Development Center for the Blind (JVDCB) (photo top left), Tsukuba Eiken Mock Interview Program at Special Needs Education School for the Visually Impaired, University of Tsukuba, VVI Newsletter distributed to 200 visually impaired friends, and English conversation classes at Japan Braille Library.

Foreign Students' Circle (FSC)

FSC volunteers typically mentor foreign university students and introduce them to Japanese cultural experiences, but this year embraced the opportunity to flip the program on its head. FSC held virtual events in which foreign students introduced their countries to each other and CWAJ members. They spoke passionately about personal history, geography, culture, food, everyday life, and even recommended the best spots to visit. These conversations transported participants around the world while staying safely at home. CWAJ members, foreign students and FSC alumni participated in the events, which included lively Q&A sessions and the chance to connect with each other virtually.

In October 2020, FSC was lucky to be able to visit the "Manga City Tokyo Nippon Manga, Anime, Games, Special Effects 2020" Exhibition at the The National Art Center, Tokyo in small groups of students and volunteers (photo top center).

English Outreach for Children (EOC)

EOC provides "Fun-in-English" literacy-based lessons for children at St. Joseph Children's Home located in western Tokyo. Monthly visits find EOC volunteers dressed up as characters from the English books on which lessons are based. Children and EOC members sing, play games and hold conversations in English, which is great fun for all.

Although in-person visits have been suspended since March 2020, EOC volunteers send seasonally themed packages filled with English books and gifts to the children in order to convey our dedication to them and to help them retain the English words and phrases that they have learned. The children sent beautiful handmade thank you cards with pictures of their smiling faces (photo top right), which fill us with hope.

CULTURAL PROGRAMS

Monthly General Meetings

The CWAJ Cultural Programs team curates a speaker series that is a cornerstone of CWAJ General Meetings. Monthly meetings allow us to share organization-wide information, learn from engaging speakers and socialize with each other. After dazzling January 2020 meeting attendees with a riveting musical performance by members of the Miyamoto Unosuke Shoten performance troupe and having Stuart Varnam-Atkin deliver an insightful lecture about Shakespeare at our February meeting, Cultural Programs was faced with the challenge of continuing this highly regarded series when in-person meetings ceased.

When general meetings moved to a virtual format, Cultural Programs welcomed the opportunity to gather members, not only those in Tokyo, but also Overseas Members and past scholars. Attendees in June enjoyed a Rakugo performance in English by Katsura Sunshine that offered levity and a sense of connection after so much time apart. Dynamic online gatherings have kept members engaged beyond the confines of their homes and with each other even though we are scattered across Tokyo and the globe.



Our 2020 speaker series also included a virtual art tour by member Ursula Bartlett in conjunction with the CWAJ Open Print Art Gallery, a discussion of contemporary print techniques by Katsutoshi Yuasa, a look inside Japanese corporate boards from an American woman's perspective by Jenifer Rogers, and a glimpse through the lens of a photographer's camera by Natsuki Yasuda. Cultural Programs offer members and their guests an opportunity to bond through enriching presentations.
