As the inaugural CWAJ Cartier Scholar, I have had the unique privilege of immersing myself in a vibrant and diverse educational environment. Over half of my cohort of 338 students from 63 countries are women.

My Oxford experience extends beyond the classroom. I have been actively participating in the Interdisciplinary Food Systems Teaching and Learning Program, engaging with students from different disciplines and universities. These interactions have been instrumental in broadening my perspective on global food systems. An eagerly awaited element of the upcoming term is my participation in the Impact Lab. This prestigious program at Oxford is an opportunity for hands- on learning and leadership development.

Reflecting on the past four months, the most significant takeaway has been the unlearning and relearning process. Stepping out of my startup-focused mindset, I have opened my eyes to a multitude of solutions to global challenges.

Being the CWAJ Cartier Scholar has been a transformative experience. It's more than just an academic pursuit; it's a journey of personal growth, cultural exchange, and professional development. I am grateful for this opportunity and excited about the possibilities that lie ahead.

"If it was not for the CWAJ Scholarship, I would not have had the courage to step out of the traditional Japanese society. Though I desperately wanted to study abroad to change my career, very few people around me thought it was a good idea. The CWAJ Scholarship not only provided me with financial assistance but also gave me the big YES, you should do it!"

Ms. Oishi started her career at a large Japanese financial institution before the passage of the 1985 Equal Employment Law, an era when working women were not treated as equals with their male colleagues. Feeling frustrated, she decided to attend Harvard Business School and was awarded a CWAJ Scholarship. After graduating, she joined McKinsey & Company, a consulting firm, and was made a partner in five years. After ten years at McKinsey, she gave birth to her son and started thinking about how to improve healthcare for the next generation.

She learned that many Japanese hospitals lack good management, and often neither the patients nor the staff are happy. In 2000, Ms. Oishi left McKinsey and founded her own company, Mediva and Platanus Medical Corporation, where innovative and patient-friendly solutions prove that innovation is possible, even in the traditional field of healthcare.

Ms. Oishi plans to expand her business globally. Her journey started by becoming a CWAJ Scholar and she plans to continue solving important issues in the healthcare field.













#### COMMUNITY SERVICE

#### Volunteers for the Visually Impaired (VVI)

The Volunteers for the Visually Impaired (VVI) serve visually impaired children and adults by providing English-language programs and holding special events. Information about VVI and CWAJ events is regularly sent to 181 visually impaired friends through electronic and braille editions of our newsletter.

Twice a year, in June and October, students at the Special Needs Education School for the Visually Impaired, University of Tsukuba, prepare for the Eiken Test in Practical English Proficiency. In 2023, VVI members used Zoom to conduct mock test interviews for 21 students. A one-to-one English conversation program, led by native English-speaking CWAJ volunteers (English Conversation Partners), was also offered to students upon request.

Throughout 2023, VVI volunteers taught English twice a week at the Japan Vocational Development Center for the Blind and Low Vision. At this center, adults are re-training for jobs, and English ability is a valuable qualification. The classes are fun, practical, and help students build confidence in speaking English.

VVI also holds social events. In August, volunteers and visually impaired friends gathered at the specially-equipped Cinema Chupki Theater to watch and discuss the documentary, Young Plato.

### English Outreach for Children (EOC)

In 2023, EOC was able to restart the Fun-With-English Lessons with the children at St. Joseph's Home in Nishi-Tokyo.

Visiting with the children and helping them learn English words and phrases has been a delight. Each of our lessons is based on a different English language picture book that has been translated into Japanese by our members. We provide a QR link to a bilingual recording of our members reading the book in English and Japanese, which allows the children to enjoy the books at any time.

During each lesson, we divide the children into small groups so that our members can give individual attention to each child. Those groups rotate through various activities, exposing them to English in a variety of settings.

### Foreign Students' Circle (FSC)

FSC provides a variety of Japanese cultural programs for foreign students, former FSC students and mentors. In 2023, FSC organized the following events:

- Walking tour. In April, we took a guided tour of Enoshima in Kanagawa Prefecture where we enjoyed the landscape while learning about the history of the area.
- Kimono program. In June, we spent the day with a kimono expert who brought many casual cotton yukatas, obi belts, and beautiful silk furisode long-sleeve kimono. Students had the opportunity to wear the kimono and view antique items for kimono, such as Kanzashi hair accessories.
- Kabuki theater. In July, we learned about kabuki and saw the play, Hikimado (Sliding Window).
- CWAJ Print Show and Ohta Memorial Museum program. In October, ten FSC members enjoyed the beautiful prints as well as the Hands-on Art exhibition at the CWAI Print Show.
- · Kiyosumi Gardens tour. In November, we had a guided tour of Kiyosumi Gardens, complete with a picnic lunch. Afterward, we visited the Fukagawa Edo Museum.


